WAR IN UKRAINE: ONE YEAR ON

To commemorate the one-year anniversary since Russia invaded the Ukraine, we held a vigil in our University Chapel which, alongside students and staff, was joined by members of the Ukrainian community living in the Canterbury area.

Over the past year, the University has been proud to support the humanitarian response to the invasion, led by our Ukraine Task Force, and we continue to work closely with Canterbury City Council, the University of Kent, and local schools and colleges to ensure a co-ordinated approach to providing support.

Since March 2022, we've provided English classes for just under 200 Ukrainian people in the area, typically six hours of classes a week, at five different languages levels. We have provided accommodation for Ukrainian families, and offered mental health support and CV and employability services. We've also welcomed people from Ukraine into our staff community.

Staff and students across the University have also supported the humanitarian response to donate essential items including blankets, clothing and nappies, and raise funds.

In May 2022, we hosted a major community event – Canterbury Stands with Ukraine - in Augustine House, which brought together VIPs, city dignitaries, the general public and a wide range of charities and volunteer organisations.

We have also worked with Universities UK and the Council for At Risk Academics to support Ukrainian academics and students directly, and in June 2022 our University twinned with Open International University of Human Development (OUHD) in Kyiv. The Universities UK twinning project aims



to offer support to academics, students and university leaders in Ukraine during the conflict, and to facilitate long-term collaboration between UK and Ukrainian institutions, support their recovery, and rebuild for a sustainable future.

This is part of our wider work to support displaced academics and students from other countries due to war and other humanitarian crises, in collaboration with national and international organisations including CARA (Council at Risk for Academics), Universities UK, and Million Plus.

Spring greens



We celebrated all things green and sustainable at our Spring Festival this year! Organised by second year Event Management students, we hosted stalls from local traders who use fairtrade and sustainable practices, including Monkey and Bear (handmade accessories and clothes brand), Ollogli vegan skincare, campus regular The Refillable Van, HatHats reusable coffee cups, Canterbury Wholefoods, and many more.

All of the event organisation was also sustainable, and the festival aimed to raise awareness of our sustainable campus, crafts and wellbeing, the effect of climate change and single-use plastic on our planet, and Fairtrade and food recycling.

INSPIRING THE HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS OF TOMORROW

Local children from across Kent enjoyed a day of messy but educational fun on our campus this spring, getting hands-on experience of what it's like to work as an allied health professional. The practical sessions gave Year 5 pupils the chance to delve their hands into jelly to find plastic organs, balance as part of physio exercise, and practice their suturing skills on vegan bacon.

The day was organised as part of the Kent Schools Project, a pilot project aimed at inspiring the next generation of allied health professionals. The project brings together NHS Kent and Medway Allied Health Professional Faculty, the Golden Thread Alliance, and Canterbury Christ Church University.

Karen Amber, NHS Kent and Medway's Allied Health Professional Faculty Lead, said: "The Kent Schools Project is designed to inspire primary school children to think of future careers in the allied health professions. We want to highlight these jobs to younger children, who often just think 'doctor' or 'nurse' when they think of jobs in healthcare."

Robin's lecture was on Weapons of Empathy, where he explored how books can give us unique insights into people minds, helping us understand one another better and act with greater empathy. Working with Canterbury City Council, the universities are planning ahead to help our students prepare to leave their local homes. Alongside Vice-Chancellor Professor Rama Thirunamachandran, dignitaries, and invited guests, The Duchess of Edinburgh was taken on a tour of the building, exploring our new industry-leading STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Medicine) facilities and interdisciplinary spaces. One of the largest STEM education facilities in the south east. the Verena Holmes Building is named after one of the country's most pioneering female engineers, reflecting our ambition to increase diversity and widen opportunities in STEM education and careers.

It is also the home of the Kent and Medway Medical School, an exciting collaboration with the University of Kent and the first medical school in Kent and Medway, that builds on existing high-quality clinical teaching and research strengths of both institutions. As an innovative centre for patient-focused medical education and research, talented aspiring doctors are trained from local communities and beyond, to transform the future of healthcare in the Kent and Medway region, in partnership with the NHS.

The Duchess of Edinburgh met staff and students in our new engineering labs, sports science facilities, and health simulation suites, before unveiling the ceremonial plaque to mark the official naming of the Verena Holmes Building. This was followed

by a blessing from The Rt Revd Rose Hudson Wilkin, Bishop of Dover. The Duchess of Edinburgh also visited our Tree of Trees sapling, a gift from the late Queen Elizabeth II as part of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations, which is now planted on campus.

We were honoured to welcome The Duchess of Edinburgh to our campus and share our exciting ambitions for the future.

We were deeply honoured to have been gifted one of the special saplings that formed part of the Queen's Jubilee sculpture, the Tree of Trees.

Set in silver pots embossed with Her Majesty's cypher, the trees are being given to selected community groups and organisations in recognition of their positive impact within their communities, to celebrate their work, and inspire the next generation of tree planters across

The Tree of Trees stood outside Buckingham Palace in June 2022 to mark the late Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee, and was the first in a chain of 1,500 beacons lit across the UK and Commonwealth countries.

The sculpture was also part of the Platinum Jubilee project *The Queen's Green Canopy* which invited people from across the UK to 'Plant a tree for the Jubilee', creating a legacy in honour of Her Majesty's leadership of the nation and benefiting future generations.

The tree has been planted on campus where it will now grow in pride of place.

Using modern technology to uncover ancient history

One of our lecturers has used medical imaging equipment at our Verena Holmes Building to help to reveal the secrets of a 3000-year-old child's shoe.

The rare Bronze Age shoe, thought to belong to a two or three-year-old child, is potentially the oldest to be found in the UK, and at 15cm is also thought to be the smallest Bronze Age shoe found in the world.

It was discovered in a north Kent riverbed by archaeologist Steve Tomlinson as he was mudlarking last September with fellow archaeologist, Emily Brown, and has been carbon dated to 888-781BC, the Late Bronze Age period. James Elliott, Senior Lecturer in Diagnostic Radiography at Canterbury Christ Church University, used an X-ray to discover that the underside of the sole is imprinted with a textile pattern, suggesting it had either been wrapped in or pressed against a piece of material for some time. Further examinations into the material, as well as DNA testing, could reveal more about the owner of the ancient shoe, as well as how it was made.

Making Canterbury's streets safer



Along with key partners, we have been awarded a £589,042 boost towards making Canterbury safer for everyone.

The funding from the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund has been received following a successful bid by the University and a range of partners, including Canterbury City Council, Kent Police, and Kent Police and Crime Commissioner Matthew Scott.

The majority of the funding will be targeted towards preventing violence against women and girls, sexual harassment and misconduct, cracking down on anti-social behaviour, and preventing robberies, and will be used

to propose suitable sustainability plans for interventions and tackling perpetrators.

We will be leading on the research that will provide insights into the lived experiences of our community and how we can make our public spaces safer. This research will create a deeper understanding of the attitudes, beliefs, behaviours and practices of a range of communities, including students, residents and night-time economy professionals, which will inform the development of resources that raise awareness of such crimes, increase the level of support for victims and survivors, and work towards prevention and early intervention
