

# Growing talent for Kent and Medway's STEM industries

We have signed a new partnership agreement with Discovery Park, Sandwich, to help attract and retain much-needed regional talent, and develop student enterprise and commercial services for Discovery Park's tenants. It will also help create innovation zones and draw companies and jobs to Kent and Medway.

Discovery Park through the University's Life Sciences Industry Liaison Lab, where students and staff link up with companies working at the cutting edge of research, helping them to find solutions that lead to new treatments and ground-breaking discoveries.

The partnership also provides outreach activities through Community Lab, an initiative with Pfizer and the charity STEM Learning, providing access to educational opportunities for local schoolchildren to discover and develop an interest in STEM subjects, and encourage them to pursue STEM careers.

The new alliance will further accelerate student enterprise and commercialisation for Discovery Park-based companies, supporting the delivery of a shared vision to position Kent and Medway as a globally recognised hub for engineering, science and technology and the knowledge-based economy. By sharing resources and knowledge to stimulate new skills, and attract and foster talent, our collaboration will supercharge local STEM enterprise, and aims to significantly boost the region's economy and improve people's lives.

# 60 Years in 60 Seconds

As part of our Diamond Jubilee celebrations, we challenged our research leaders to tell us about the legacy of our research in just 60 seconds, creating minute-long videos that explain some of our key projects and the real-world impact they are having on our communities.

## MEDIATION SERVICES FOR THE COMMUNITY

Our Mediation Clinic provides quality, professional mediation services to the local and wider community for the resolution of a range of civil and commercial disputes, including property and workplace issues, as well as offering free student mediation services.

Mediation is an alternative route to going to court, to resolve problems and find solutions, with the guidance of an impartial mediator. Solutions found through mediation can also be much more creative, rather than the restrictive remedies

The Mediation Clinic is also a vital learning environment for law students at the University. Students can link the work of the clinic to their curriculum and gain valuable skills by learning first-hand how to mediate and resolve disputes. With the parties' consent, students offer their support by sitting in on the mediation sessions, preparing cases and reflecting on the outcomes.

### remembering queen elizabeth II

Along with the nation, we mourned, and are still moved by, the loss of Queen Elizabeth II. As the Supreme Governor of the Church of England, as well as our Head of State, the monarch has deep significance for Canterbury Christ Church University, and we are honoured by this connection.

As part of our Diamond Jubilee, our first cohort of students recently came together to share and celebrate recollections of their time studying with us, including their memories of the Queen's visit to our University in 1965.

Alumna Lorna Daymond remembered the Queen visiting the library: "When she went into the library, she was interested in the children's picture books and she suddenly came alive over that – she was a mother. It all became personal, and I think that was really lovely."

Alumnus Stan Forster said: "It was a joyous day – everyone really enjoyed it. We were the first students, who also got to meet the Queen, and since then we've all kept together – we've kept the bond. I think as the University was a smaller institution it was easier to keep in touch but the fact that we're sixty years on – it shows there is a real strong bond between us. It's great to have."


#### Thursday 20 – Saturday 22 April **Quad, North Holmes Road Campus**

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## VISION 2030

In 2023, we will be launching the next stage of our history, as we create our Vision for 2030. We are developing a new strategic framework that will guide our University over the next seven years, focused on creating an inclusive, sustainable, innovative and collaborative future. This strategic framework will set the direction and plans for the University, and will be the driving force to shape what we do and who we are.



Much has changed since our last strategic framework was launched – on a global level, we have seen Brexit and its impact, the COVID-19 pandemic, and frequent geo-political shifts and threats. In the UK, the regulation and operation of the Higher Education sector in England has seen many changes. In that time, our University has also opened the new Daphne Oram Creative Arts Building and the Verena Holmes STEM

(Science, Technology, Engineering, Health and Medicine) Building which includes the first Kent and Medway Medical School, a joint collaboration with the University of Kent. We have significantly developed our offering in new subject areas such as engineering and medicine and we've seen growth in our higher education provision partnerships and the number of our international students. Overall, today we are a University with over 20,000 students, 1800 staff and an income of £225 million.

We are now looking forward to what life will look like in 2030, to the role we will have and how we can meet the ever-changing challenges and needs of the world, including our region and local communities.

Governors, colleagues, students, alumni, and stakeholders of the University have collectively shaped how we must adapt and find new ways of delivering education, research and enterprise to maintain a successful future. We have also set out how we will continue to make a real and lasting difference in terms of supporting the regional workforce and economy, community, climate change, and sustainability.

We will be building on our roots in the community, continuing to provide a flow of skilled, professional graduates into vital public services, while helping strengthen the region's engineering and creative industries. We are keenly aware of our civic responsibilities, and are committed to sharing knowledge and resources with local industries, businesses and partners, to create a brighter future for Kent and Medway.

# SUCCESSFULLY GETTING GRADUATES INTO EMPLOYMENT

We're delighted that the latest Graduate Outcomes survey has shown that Canterbury Christ Church University is third in the UK for graduates in employment. The Graduate Outcomes survey is the UK's largest annual social survey which captures the perspectives and current status of recent graduates.

The new survey also revealed that:

- 88% of Canterbury Christ Church graduates were in employment 15 months after completing their studies, higher than the sector average of 80%
- 76% of UK, full-time Canterbury Christ Church undergraduate leavers who were

in employment went into high-skilled employment 15 months after completing their studies. This is higher than the national average of 71%

We're incredibly proud of all our graduates who are making such a positive contribution to our communities. We embed employability into our courses and

across the University from the day our students start their education journey with us. Through our partnerships with industry and local businesses, we ensure that our courses are relevant to industry needs, and support students to become high-skilled graduates that will aid economic growth regionally, nationally and internationally.

# DIAMOND JUBILEE SERVICE, CANTERBURY CATHEDRAL

More than 600 students, alumni, staff, governors, civic dignitaries and stakeholders from the local community came together at Canterbury Cathedral in celebration of our Diamond Jubilee on 30 September.

The day began with a Thanksgiving service in the Cathedral at which the University's Chancellor, The Most Revd and Rt Hon Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, presided. During the service, current students gave musical renditions, alumni shared stories and reflections of their time studying at the University, and University and Cathedral choirs performed traditional and original pieces.

The Archbishop of Canterbury spoke of wisdom, imagination, thoughtfulness, compassion, and an ambition to change the world, saying: "A university that brings those things together so that people go out and say 'I'm going to change the world and leave it

better, with the knowledge I have gained and will go on gaining', well that is the treasure. Universities enable the poorest to gain the advantage. This University has given to so many across the 60 years, across this land and across the world."

The service was followed by a celebratory reception on our Canterbury Campus. Guests were entertained with live music and enjoyed a Jubilee Street Party-themed lunch. There was also a showcase of the University's heritage, which included a Jubilee exhibition, an archaeology showcase of artefacts found on campus, a choir performance, as well as tours of the former Canterbury prison.



# STUDENTS FOR ACTIVISM

As part of our ongoing commitment to creating a more sustainable future, we recently hosted a day of collaborative events focused on social and environmental justice.

The Social and Environmental Justice for a Sustainable Future event called staff, students and the local community together to explore and analyse different aspects of social and environmental justice through workshops, interactive activities, and talks from University lecturers and external speakers.

Simon Hood, Research Analyst at Runnymede Trust, the UK's leading independent race equality think tank, opened the event with a keynote speech and Q&A on 'Race and the Environmental Emergency'. Further talks from guest speakers included 'Indigenous Peoples and Climate Change' from expert Alex Ntung, and a talk exploring climate science denial and vulnerability to eco-fascism from Heather Luna, the former Education for Sustainable Development Project Coordinator for the Higher Education Academy.

There was also a range of stalls from campaigners and activist organisations, student societies and community groups, while students led an 'Anti Fast Fashion Awareness' workshop to encourage more sustainable thinking in fashion and buying clothes.

# First Football Association talent centre for local girls

For the first time, Kentish girls will be given the chance to progress into elite football through a new Kent Girls Emerging Talent Centre, run by the Kent Football Association (Kent FA), using facilities at our Verena Holmes Building and our specialist partner facility, Polo Farm Sports Club.

The initiative aims to identify and develop talented local players from ages 8 to 16

by providing elite coaching, and access to the elite equipment and facilities on our campuses. It will offer dedicated staff to support the girls' holistic development throughout their time on the Kent FA programme, and our University will also provide direct sports science support from academics, exposure to specialist strength and conditioning training, workshops, fitness testing and performance analysis to complete the experience for the players.

We are delighted to work in partnership with the Kent FA to support and develop new talent across Kent, ensuring equal opportunities for local female players and helping diversity and inclusion thrive.
