We're excited to announce our new Public Lecture series for 2021/22, a thoughtprovoking, entertaining programme of free events that is open to all. This year, our speakers will include:

Our 2021/22 series starts with Dame Sara Thornton DBE QPM, on Tuesday 26 October 2021.

As the current UK Independent Anti-Slavery Commissioner, Dame Sara Thornton has a UK-wide remit to encourage good practice in the prevention, detection, investigation and prosecution of modern slavery offences and the identification of victims. She is a retired British police officer who was the first Chair of the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC), the former Chief Constable of Thames Valley Police and Vice President of the Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPO).

Queen's Birthday Honours for our alumni and Deputy Vice-Chancellor

Professor Helen James, our Deputy Vice-Chancellor, has been awarded an OBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours List 2021, for services to higher education. In particular, for championing women and diverse students into science and engineering, as well as helping those from disadvantaged backgrounds to access higher education.

As senior strategic and founding lead for the Kent and Medway Engineering, Design, Growth and Enterprise (EDGE) Hub, Professor James led the seven-year development of the recently opened £65 million Verena Holmes STEM building on the Canterbury Campus.

Professor Helen James said: "I am absolutely thrilled to receive this honour. Education genuinely transforms lives. It has been a dream come true to be able to lead the vision for the development of an inclusive STEM ecosystem for Kent and Medway. Thank you staff, students and communities."

Two of our alumni, Liam Preston and Casey Abbott, have also been awarded the British Empire Medal (BEM).

Liam Preston, alumnus of BA (Hons) Film,

former Christ Church Students' Union President, receives his BEM for Services to Young People.

Currently YMCA's Head of Communications, Liam has made a huge voluntary contribution both to the British Youth Council, first as Trustee then Chair, and the UK Youth Parliament, campaigning for better policies for young people both in the UK and within Europe. Liam said: "Volunteering is hard work, involving hours of time often away from the family. But, having the Queen and country recognise you in this way is such an honour."

Casey Abbott, who graduated with a BSc (Hons) Business Studies in 2005, has been awarded a BEM for Services to Retail. Casey is currently Store Manager for Food Warehouse, successfully managing an outlet that won a company award for the best retail store in the south. In the early stages of the Covid-19 pandemic, Casey came up with the idea of priority opening to support the elderly and people in need – an approach which was then imitated by so many other stores around the country.

A safer city

We work with key organisations across Canterbury to help ensure that our students and neighbours can socialise safely in the city.

The Canterbury night-time economy has a prestigious Purple Flag award for providing a vibrant mix of entertainment while promoting the safety and wellbeing of visitors and local residents. To support this, Canterbury Christ Church University works in collaboration with the University of Kent, Kent Union, Christ Church Students' Union, Canterbury City Council, Kent Police, Canterbury BID, and other partners, to provide our students with a range of support.

This includes Street Marshals, who help students get home safely and patrol busy spots around town, and the *Safe Taxi* scheme, which provides direct access to registered taxis in an emergency without the need to pay the fare immediately.

Many night-time premises have joined Zero Tolerance, an accreditation scheme that indicates these establishments have zero tolerance to sexual harassment. We also run Pop Up Safety Hubs, which are set up to welcome new students to the city, provide local information and give advice on how to stay safe on a night out.

PUT YOUR PAWS TOGETHER FOR OLIVER


Oliver, our justice facility dog, has been named Assistance Animal of the Year at this year's national Animal Star Awards.

Oliver is the first facility dog in the world to be placed at a university for research purposes, and currently the only facility dog of his kind within the UK.

In 2020, Oliver began working with Victim Support Europe as part of a facility dog programme to support victims and witnesses during legal proceedings across a number of European countries. The research is being used to help inform the development of the first Facility Dog Programme in Europe.

Oliver has also been supporting local paramedics throughout the pandemic by visiting the South East Coast Ambulance Service, providing them with comfort and support.





EXTRA LOCAL GROWTH FUNDING FOR EDGE HUB

Our innovative Engineering, Design, Growth and Enterprise (EDGE Hub) initiative, has been awarded £901,128 of Local Growth Funding by the South East Local Enterprise Partnership (SELEP).

EDGE Hub (Engineering, Design, Growth and Enterprise) will strengthen the retention of high-quality graduate skills across critical science, engineering and technology sectors in the region. The hub also aims to increase diversity in Kent and Medway's workforce, with a strong focus on helping more women and those from disadvantaged backgrounds into STEM careers.

SELEP Chair Christian Brodie, said: "As the UK begins its recovery from the pandemic, we need to ensure that we are fostering the right skills for our future economy, paving the way for boosting skills in the south east and attracting future inward investment into Kent and Medway."

The hub also will support entrepreneurial activity and be a catalyst for digital

transformation in Kent and Medway. EDGE Hub is projected to deliver an additional £7.6m to £11.4m into the regional economy each year, injecting 1,250 highly skilled Engineering and Technology graduates into the local economy by 2024.

Increasing access to education with the Global Banking School

In a major new partnership with the Global Banking School, we now offer a four-year Business and Tourism Management degree with Foundation Year across the country. The course is validated by Christ Church and leads to a Christ Church award but is delivered by the Global Banking School (GBS), which specialises in a range of industry-focused courses offered across four locations in London, Manchester, and Birmingham. Our students will study across these campuses outside Kent, helping us in our goal to lower barriers to entry and increase access to higher education. In 2021, over 1,500 new Christ Church students started their Business and Tourism Management degree via this new programme.

Professor Mohamed Abdel-Maguid, Pro Vice-Chancellor (STEM) and Dean of Science, Engineering and Social Sciences, said: "Our relationship with GBS will see us operating on multi-entry calendars where we have intake points throughout the year, giving us more opportunities to support additional harder-to-reach students and communities."

Ji Sun Sjogren

This autumn, we're delighted to host two new exhibitions in our gallery spaces on campus. We know there is no substitute for experiencing the arts in real life, and we're thrilled to be able to offer in-person events safely again.

Our first exhibition, entitled *Things Not Meant To Be Seen*, was created by Euphemia MacTavish, and will run from 20 September to 30 October in the Daphne Oram Gallery on our city campus. In this new exhibition, MacTavish brings together works made in situ in Luxor, Egypt, over the past seven years.

Working in the major archaeological sites of the Ramesseum Temple, the Valley of the Kings, and Tombs of the Nobles, these highly detailed paintings and etchings both document and encode the spaces, capturing the collision of ancient histories and the contemporary life that continues all around. Immersing herself in these locations, MacTavish brings careful attention and focus to things never meant to be seen.

Ji Sun Sjogren has created *The Procedure*, an exhibition which features a series of 25 pencil drawings demonstrating the steps that Ji Sun Sjogren takes as a scrub nurse over the course of a morning's operation. This exhibition will take place in the Verena Holmes Gallery from 20 September to 17 December. Having originally trained and worked as an artist, Ji Sun Sjogren recently embarked on a new career as a nurse and now continues the ancient links between illustration and medical studies in her new works. Alongside this work are examples of sketchbooks from Sjogren's time as a nursing student at Canterbury Christ Church University and recent drawings of her experiences working through the Covid-19 pandemic.

STUDENT-RUN TALKING THERAPY FOR

In our June 2020 issue of Community Matters, we featured a group of our Mental Health Nursing and Midwifery students who created their own volunteer scheme to support the vulnerable during the pandemic, offering a free check-in and chat service for local people.

One of these students, Alex Richardson, has now received investor backing to expand this into a talking therapy service called Keep Talking, which aims to help support people who are struggling with mental health issues and placed in residential care. He also plans to work towards turning

the service into a registered charity and diversifying its offer, collaborating with local businesses to capture more groups in need, such as children who have been affected by bullying.

Alex said: "The reason Keep Talking Services was started was because I couldn't sit back and watch loneliness cripple our community. I want this to be a national scheme and I believe with the people I have around me invested in my project, one day we will achieve that."
