






Strategic Guidance Framework for International Policing (SGF)


The SGF has been designated by the UN Secretary-General as the systemwide doctrine guiding UN policing and its related training initiatives in S/2016/952 and S/2018/1183.

Benefits of the SGF

Tangible, not aspirational, standards: police.un.org/SGF

Formally approved on a UN intergovernmental basis

Global applicability - created with all States and Regions, not a product exclusively of the 'Global North'

Will disproportionally assist those discriminated and/or marginalised by 'law enforcement' through the equitable provision of 'fair & effective policing' which is representative, responsive and accountable





What does fair and effective policing look like?

Representative:

Police personnel sufficiently represent the community they serve;

Minority groups and women are adequately represented through fair and non-discriminatory recruitment policies in police services; and The human rights of all people are protected, promoted and respected.

Responsive:

Police are responsive to public needs and expectations, especially in preventing and detecting crime and maintaining public order; Policing objectives are attained both lawfully and humanely; Police understand the needs and expectations of the public they serve; and Police actions are responsive to public opinion and wishes.

Accountable:

Legally: police are accountable to the law, as are all individuals and institutions in States; Politically: police are accountable to the public through the democratic and political institutions of government as well as through police and citizen liaison groups; and

Economically: police are accountable for the way they use resources allocated to them.
