

## Changes to previous information

During the global COVID-19 pandemic, we prioritised the health, wellbeing and safety of our students and staff.

	For those who have completed a relevant foundation degree – such as our Childhood Studies course – the BA Childhood Studies top-up is the key to the next stage of your career or the next phase of study.					
	Upon successful completion, you will have gained a degree which opens all kinds of doors and career paths.					
	A BA Childhood Studies is also the foundation upon which you can build your route to qualified teacher status by taking a relevant postgraduate course, such as a PGCE. It is flexible and can be completed part-time around your work, or full-time over the course of a year. Moreover, the same passionate and experienced academics who run the foundation degree will support you on every step to success.					
Why study Childhood Studies?						
	This exciting area of study explores the influences that shape children's					



development and learning, their personalities, and the critical periods that will shape their journeys to adulthood.

This course is ideal for you if you have already completed the Foundation Degree in Childhood Studies and are working with children and young people aged 0-19 years in settings such as schools, nurseries, childcare, foster care, child minders, youth groups, cadets, or library services.

You will pursue your own work-based research, linking your studies to real-world experience in the workplace, and develop your understanding of how children and young people learn.

The course also offers the option of a special educational needs (SEN) pathway (if you have the required amount of credits in an SEN specialism), enabling you to explore the issues relating to this area of practice in greater depth.

Gaining an undergraduate work-based qualification whilst working in a professional role, may enhance your employment prospects and enable you to access further higher education and professional qualifications.



## Entry requirements

You are required to hold 240 credits of advanced standing (usually a foundation degree or similar; for example, a diploma of higher education or other accumulated credits at Levels 4 and 5) in a related area).

GCSE English grade C (or equivalent) is also a requirement. If you do not have English at GCSE grade C or above you will be required to take and pass the University equivalency tests for entry onto this course.

In order to study the SEN specialism at Level 6 / BA Hons level, you will need to have been awarded relevant specialist credits at Levels 4 and 5.

Additional entry requirements

You must be in a full-time work-based role (paid or voluntary), spending at least 15 hours per week in a child or young people's setting.

Entry is subject to a satisfactory Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) check (completed by the employer)

## About the course

You will study a variety of areas relevant to the support and development of children and young people with a focus on work-related methods. You will be able to critically reflect on and analyse these issues from an academic perspective whilst relating to and evaluating these against your work-based professional practice.

You will complete 120 credits (Level 6) which build on your previous 240 credits (at Levels 4 and 5) gained from your foundation degree course or equivalent.

As well as studying at University, you should be working in a child-related role (paid or voluntary) for a minimum of 15 hours per week.

In this module, you will build on your experiences of evaluating and developing work-based research tasks. You will learn about the principles and methods used in work-based enquiry. You will also plan and carry out a small-scale independent enquiry related to your professional setting.



Teaching  You will be taught face-to-face at your chosen location - our Canterbury or Medway campuses, London and South East Colleges Bromley or the Learning & Enterprise College Bexley. It is intended that the teaching would take place on one day or one evening per week (over five weeks) per module - dependent on the chosen location. Evening attendance is via a 'blended' approach and an occasional attendance on one Saturday morning per module may be required.  The course has the equivalent of 35 taught hours and 75 hours of work-based learning.  All courses are informed by the University's Learning and Teaching Strategy 2015-2022.  All lectures will be delivered digitally. Small interactive lectures may happen on campus (if suitable rooms are available).  This means that as part of 'contact hours' for the course, it is likely that you will engage with a structured mix of:  on-site face-to-face and digital learning. This will mean that courses can continue while following social distancing rules, even if further lockdowns occur. We have tried to do this in a way that is purposeful, thoughtful and driven by your likely needs.  All lectures will be delivered digitally. Small interactive lectures may happen on campus (if suitable rooms are available).
