

SPECIAL REGULATIONS: BSc (HONS) SPORTS THERAPY AND REHABILITATION

INTRODUCTION

1. These Special Regulations relate only to the following programme:

- BSc (Hons) Sports Therapy and Rehabilitation – March 2019

ADMISSION

2. The requirements for admissions are those set out in the Regulation and Credit Framework for the Conferment of Awards; the additional requirements are set out below.
3. All entrants are required to attend a selection day/event, and complete any assessments prescribed as part of the selection process.

GENERAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

4. All entrants are to satisfy the University in relation to health clearance (including occupational health requirements) following the prescribed procedures at the time of application.
5. All entrants must satisfy the requirements concerning clearance in relation to criminal convictions and any other requirements specified by the University, taking account of the requirements of the regulatory body, in relation to the protection of vulnerable persons. Students on the programme must remain in good standing in relation to such requirements, including, where required, registration for the updating of certificates by the Disclosure and Barring Service.

ADDITIONAL ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

6. An IELTS score to the standard equivalent to level 6 of the International English Language Testing System, with no element below 5.5 is required by all applicants.
7. In addition to the entrance requirement specified in the General Regulations for Conferment of Awards and any additional requirements specified by professional or regulatory bodies entrants to the programme must have achieved at least NQF level 2, GCSE or equivalent at grade C/4 in English and mathematics.

PROGRAMME AWARD

8. The award of BSc (Hons) Sports Therapy and Rehabilitation is made upon successful completion of 360 credits over a period of 3 years full-time or 6 years part-time. This is the only award that infers eligibility to apply for registration with the British Association of Sport Rehabilitators and Trainers (BASRaT).

DEFAULT EXIT AWARDS NOT LEADING TO PROFESSIONAL REGISTRATION

9. For a student who passes the theory modules and the assessment of practice in years 1 and 2 but does not complete the final year, the Board of Examiners must consider recommending an exit award that does not lead to professional recognition.
10. The following exit awards are available to students not recommended for an award leading to professional registration.
- a) To qualify for a Bachelor of Science degree in Sports Injury Management must:
 - Pass at least 60 credits at level 6
 - Pass level 5
 - Pass level 4
 - b) To qualify for a Diploma of Higher Education in Sports Injury Management students must:
 - Pass level 5
 - Pass level 4
 - c) To qualify for a Certificate of Higher Education in Sports Injury Management students must:
 - Pass level 4
11. Where an award cannot be recommended, the Board may recommend the award of institutional credits.
12. Aegrotat awards may be offered at the discretion of the Board of Examiners as outlined in the regulations; however, such awards would not provide eligibility to apply for admission to the relevant professional register.
13. As a BASRaT Accredited Programme, all the required competencies are mapped against all modules and are therefore core. Starred modules are not available on this programme.

CREDIT EXEMPTION ON ENTRY

14. RPL is not permitted unless transferring from a BASRaT Accredited Programme.

ASSESSMENT

15. All components of assessment must be passed. The University regulations regarding reassessment apply.

COMPENSATION

16. The programme is excluded from University regulations regarding compensation.
17. There can be no compensation for failure in the assessment of practice and there can be no compensation between theory and practice. Students must pass successfully all elements of practice learning.

PROGRESSION

18. A student may only progress from one year or one part of the programme to the next on successful completion of the required practice assessment.

PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE AND CONDUCT

19. Students are required to make a formal declaration of good health and good character at the beginning of each year of the programme and notify the University of any changes that may impact on their fitness to practise. Potential breaches of professional conduct will be subject to the fitness to practise procedures.

ATTENDANCE

20. As a condition of professional accreditation, as a Graduate Sports Rehabilitator (GSR) and registration with BASRaT, students must successfully meet the requirements concerning attendance, in that students must attend 80% of all timetabled events.
