

## STUDENTS AWARDED THE ALBERT CERTIFICATE

In March, Year 3 students on the Film, Radio and Television Studies and Film Production degrees, doing the Professional Perspectives in the Creative Industries employability module led by Dr Ken Fox have been awarded their Albert certificates: Applied Skills for a Sustainable Media Industry, after successful completion of the module. The certificate is awarded through BAFTA and Albert.org. CCCU is a member of the Albert Educational Partnership with approximately 35 other universities who teach Screen Studies across the UK.

The Albert certificate is now media industry standard for all film and TV productions. If you watch any BBC, ITV, Channel 4 or Sky programmes you will see the Albert logo at the end of the credits.

Dr Ken Fox, module leader from the School of Creative Arts & Industries commented: "This certificate is a great addition to the students' CV while also raising their awareness of how to produce media output in a sustainable way. They win and the planet wins."

Harry Cooper, a Year 3 Film Production student who completed the certification had this to say: "I'm proud to achieve Albert certification. The fight against climate change

is hugely important and Albert is leading the way. By having this on my CV I am able to align myself with the goals of this industry and employers as we move towards positive environmental changes."



## **GOOD EDUCATION IN A FRAGILE WORLD**

This book is unique; it is solely written by CCCU staff about CCCU teaching. It brings together context sensitive perspectives into a coherent narrative, through a journey that has developed new perspectives and knowledge about what good education needs to look like in our increasingly fragile world.

So, how do you launch a book that has emerged in such an organic way, that has taken two years from initial gathering to fruition? Coeditors, Alan Bainbridge and Nicola Kemp decided to put together a lecture that tells the story of the 'Pilgrimage' that describes the evolution of theory and practice. It is the outcome of a process of continued 'troubling over' the relationship between education and sustainability.

The 'Call' for the book is traced back to 2017 when they began to explore the potential of 'thinking educationally about sustainability and sustainably about education'. The 'Quest' for the group of pilgrims was to understand what it might mean for sustainability to 'shake out its wings and fly' within the context of higher education. They drew on key education thinkers, Gert Biesta, Mike Bottery and Ronald Barnett, with the quest being specifically an educational quest.

In order to orient the pilgrimage, they developed the Paradox Model that is based on two key educational tensions or paradoxes when engaging with sustainability in HE contexts. On the one hand how to meaningfully address the urgency of climate change through the 'slow ways of education'; and whether this is possible through existing structures and processes or whether they need to be resisted.

Further tensions arose as the they edited the book, which were also explored during the lecture, until they reached their ultimate goal; an emergent 'Manifesto for Good Higher Education'.

The event then moved into a reflective space through a poem read by Vicky Field, before Ronald Barnett (Author of the Foreward) gave an impassioned critique of what he called a 'Big book'! He then chaired a short panel session that brought together three of the chapter authors, Simon Wilson, Sonia Overall and John-Paul Riordan, who provided thoughtful reflections on questions from the audience and the panel chair.
