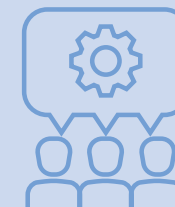
Aim: Reduce the sustainability impacts of the supply chain and contribute to the University's net zero target

- **Decision Making** – We will make informed procurement decisions based on research, analysis and evidence

Deliver Value

Objectives:

1. Ensure contracts are awarded using the appropriate procurement process
2. Maximise the use of collaborative framework agreements
3. Utilise the supply chain as 'trusted advisors' to the University
4. Develop excellent relationships with strategic suppliers
5. Ensure all value offered by a supplier in their tender proposal is taken up
6. Record and report the value provided by the supply chain (including financial and non-financial benefits)



Sustainability & Net Zero

Objectives:

1. Complete a Sustainability Impact Assessment for all contracts
2. Develop a Sustainability Action Plan for all high-impact contracts
3. Use sustainability issues as a criterion when selecting suppliers
4. Assess each contract to identify supply chains at risk of modern slavery and forced labour
5. Identify the suppliers who produce the most carbon and work with them to reduce emissions



Minimise Waste & Inefficiency

Objectives:

1. Ensure strategic contracts are managed professionally to maintain high levels of performance
2. Develop strategies for all key categories of spend to avoid duplication, spot buying and process inefficiency
3. Continuously improve transactional purchasing processes to ensure efficiency and effectiveness
4. Regularly benchmark high-spend contracts so the University does not pay above market rate
5. Maintain a pipeline of upcoming contract renewals and new projects so procurement processes can be undertaken in a timely manner
6. Ensure a signed contract is in place for all strategic contracts so suppliers can be held to account



Cost Savings

Objectives:

1. Always use competitive processes to award contracts unless there is a compelling reason not to
2. Maximise the use of pre-negotiated framework agreements
3. Agree long-term contracts with suppliers rather than spot-buying short term requirements
4. Ensure specifications are 'fit for purpose' not 'nice to have'
5. Challenge request for inflationary price increases from suppliers



Compliance

Objectives:

1. Ensure all procurement processes comply with the Public Contracts Regulations (PCR) 2015
2. Brief staff involved in procurement activities on the implications of PCR2015 and the financial procedures
3. Ensure that companies bidding for CCCU contracts are treated fairly
4. Guarantee the transparency, integrity, fairness and accountability of all procurement procedures
5. Regularly review and update procedures to ensure changes in legislation or good practice are adopted
