Visit from Prof Kristen Abbott-Anderson Professor of Nursing Minnesota State University, Mankato, USA

Prof Abbott-Anderson specialises in dementia and during her stay, she visited a number of dementia-related facilities such as the AgeUK day centre in Herne Bay and the Harmonia Village, East Kent Hospitals NHS Trust, an innovative residential facility to support independent living for people living with dementia.

On 4th October, Kristen presented, together with Dr Pat Chung, at the Lunchtime Research Seminar on the topic of: 'Carers' Experience of Having a Loved-One with Dementia in Long-term Care During the COVID-19 Pandemic: An International Grounded Theory Study'. This was an opportunity to share findings from the collaborative project they are working on.

School of Nursing Midwifery and Social Work: Remembering Colin Johnson

Jacqueline Wier organised the remembrance even held on 4th October for Colin Johnson.

Within the School of Nursing Midwifery and Social Work we were privileged recently to host a visiting Professor, Kristen Abbott Anderson from Minnesota State University in the United States of America. The connection between the Faculty and School arose as a result of an international project which is entitled: Carers' Experience of Having a Loved-One with Dementia in Long-term Care During the COVID-19 Pandemic: An International Grounded Theory Study.



Our colleague Colin Johnson's professional interests included supporting people with dementia and their families and was a published author in this area. He taught dementia modules to both undergraduate and postgraduate students and was one of the first academics to contact Kristen Abbott Anderson about the study and how he could become involved in it. As part of her visit, it was therefore fitting that an event was held to remember Colin who sadly died earlier in the year. The event included part of the Nursing Associate student exhibition on Dementia and Colin's Research Poster which he presented to the Annual School of Nursing Midwifery and Social Work Conference in 2019. The event enabled colleagues and students to remember Colin and gave them the opportunity to speak about the positive impact he had on their lives, both personally and professionally.

All who attended the event agreed that Colin was a role model to colleagues and students alike, and demonstrated professionalism, compassion, care, commitment, and loyalty to everyone he met, and that he is sadly missed.

Cross-Faculty Research Sandpit Events

In March and May 2022, the Faculty of Arts Humanities and Education and Faculty of Medicine, Health and Social Care held half-day Joint Research Sandpit events to support early career researchers in developing grant applications.

During the events, a number of presentations from both internal and external speakers provided opportunities to discuss project ideas and consider steps towards the development of grant applications, including:

- Networking research opportunities across Faculties

Colleagues were also offered the opportunity to attend other research

development events in July: a Cross-Faculty Writing Retreat and two Workshops, Quality of Research Outputs and Impact of Research.

More cross-Faculty research development events are planned for the academic year 2022-23.

School of Nursing Midwifery & Social Work Annual Research & Scholarship Conference

The Annual School of Nursing, Midwifery and Social Work Research & Scholarship Conference took place on Thursday 15th September 2022. This year the conference was held in Canterbury. 30 academics, postgraduate research students and partners from local practice attended the event. The aim was to enable presenters to share their research projects in a reassuring environment.

The keynote speaker was Dr Heather Baid, a registered nurse specialising in intensive care practice and a Principal Lecturer at the University of Brighton. She spoke about sustainability issues, including how to reduce the environmental footprint of

healthcare practice with financial and social co-benefits. She discussed sustainability in terms of the curriculum and led a discussion with the audience on how to include sustainability within the teaching and research.

Those who presented included academics and postgraduate research students. Presenters gave 20-minute presentations of both completed and "work in progress" projects. A variety of methodologies were exhibited.



The conference also included 14 research posters, which depicted ongoing work from colleagues and postgraduate research and students in the School, along with posters from students who are completing the Faculty of Medicine, Health and Social Care Level 7 Stage 3 Research Dissertation Module.

This enabled attendees at the conference to view the research topics that level 7 students are studying in the module, and to consider how they might support students through academic supervision.

ADAPT

CCCU is leading the 'Training of Health Care Professionals in Assistive Technologies (AT)' element of the four year European funded [Interreg France (Channel Manche) England] ADAPT Project, which aims to empower disabled people through robotic technologies



Since the last update, the ADAPT project was granted a 3-month extension and officially finished on 30th September 2022, with the Final Event hosted on 28th June at University of Kent with a live video link to project partners in France. Achievements of the project were celebrated, including the development of innovative new Electric Powered Wheelchair and simulator technology, and the development and evaluation of the ADAPT Assistive Technology (AT) Training programme.



To date, over 1,500 learners have undertaken training units. Of these learners, just over 1,000 have completed end of unit or 6-month evaluation questionnaires. Evaluation data will be analysed and written up in end of project reports, which will be available in early 2023.

The final unit of the ADAPT AT training programme 'ADAPT Train the Trainer' is now available, and recommended for those who have completed units 1 to 5. The programme will remain open in the UK until 31st December 2022. EMPOWERCARE

EMPOWERing individuals & communities to manage their own CARE is a European funded project (Interreg 2 Seas) in France, Belgium, Netherlands and the UK

The CCCU team evaluation of the EMPOWERCARE project has continued apace and they are beginning to uncover some interesting findings.



At the end of May, all project partners met in person for the first time since 2020 in leper. May was also the month the team presented an academic poster at the 22nd International conference of integrated care (ICIC22) in Odense, Denmark.

EMPOWERCARE held its 2nd Project Annual Conference virtually on 14th September 2022. Over 60 representatives from all 13 project partners based across the UK, Belgium, Netherlands, and France attended. The event was targeted to Local Government representatives, Health professionals, Care Organisations and Tech Developers.

Project partners met at the university of Brighton on 6th-7th October to align project outputs as the EMPOWERCARE project moved into its final stages. Representatives from University of Brighton, Canterbury Christ Church University, Province of Antwerp and VITO were able to attend in person, with other partners attending remotely. Attendees were given the opportunity to learn more about the living labs in Brighton (https://www.brighton.ac.uk/research/enterprise/enterprise-projects/brighton-and-hove-digital-health-living-lab.aspx). Partners Kent County Council attended remotely and provided a virtual tour of their Digital Innovation Centre based in Folkstone (https://www.digitalinnovationcentre.care/). They demonstrated how they use the high tech virtual and physical space to deliver learning, teaching and training that is focused on empowering individuals and communities to better care for themselves.



The EMPOWERCARE Project final conference will take place online on 25th January 2023. The conference will include a number of exciting keynote speakers (details tbc), a skills lab, demonstrations of best practise, as well as talks on initiative outputs and a discussion on the future of the project. MOTION (Mechanised Orthosis for Children with Neurological Disorders)

MOTION is a European funded project (Interreg 2 Seas) to advance the development, validation and adoption of bionic rehabilitation technology for children with neurological disorders to improve their quality of life





In October 2022, the CCCU MOTION project team attended a workshop at Thomas More University Belgium to see live demonstrations of the powered ankle-foot orthosis (PAFO), hip module and smart garment. The PAFO is designed for gait training in children with cerebral palsy (CP). This walking device provides robotic assistance at the ankle joints during different phases of gait, tuned to the requirements of each child. It was great to see live demonstrations of an adult walking with the PAFO and to hear a progress update regarding their trials in relation to children with CP. It was interesting to find out how they use an automated digital workflow for the design of tailor-made orthotics.


The hip module is also designed for gait training in children with CP; however, the actuators assist the movement at the hip. The working mechanism of the hip module and safety features were demonstrated during the workshop.



Smart Garment

The smart garment integrates sensing technology to monitor children while wearing a robotic exoskeleton. The garment has electrocardiogram, respiration rate, heat flux and galvanic skin response sensors. Promising validation results of the smart garment were presented and we got to see how the smart garment front-end application works.

Following the live demonstrations, we had a meeting to discuss the plans for testing the technology. Our engineering partners from the University of Kent are creating a copy of the PAFO and the CCCU MOTION project team will be conducting tests with the device in children with CP at Chailey Clinical Services, Sussex Community NHS Foundation Trust.

Alzheimer Europe Conference, 17th -19th October 2022

We attended the 32nd Alzheimer Europe conference held under the theme 'building bridges', promoting good dementia care through collaboration. Our virtual poster featuring 'cross border initiatives' presented some interim evaluation findings about one of the CASCADE model implementation sites in Bel-

gium. The hybrid conference setting was opportune for the team to attend and catch up on presentations of interest. We look forward to disseminating the final findings from the two CASCADE implementation sites in Belgium.

DWELL (Diabetes and WELLbeing)

DWELL is a European funded project (Interreg 2 Seas 2014-2020 Programme) which aims to empower patients with Type 2 diabetes in the UK, Belgium, France and the Netherlands to self-manage their condition and improve their wellbeing



Delivery of the 12-week DWELL programme continues across sites in the UK and France, with evaluation activities running in parallel. Final analysis will take place towards the end of 2022, with final evaluation reports available in Spring 2023.

The bi-annual DWELL Steering Group Meeting took place at the Ashford International Hotel on 11th-12th May 2022. The CCCU DWELL team presented preliminary evaluation results, including positive improvements in relation to metabolic health, patient empowerment, management of diabetes, physical and mental health, physical activity, and quality of life.

The qualitative data further highlighted these positive findings:

"I feel better for the food I eat now and have more energy...DWELL has totally empowered me...it has had the most massive impact on my life" (DWELL participant, 2018 cohort)

The DWELL Final Conference took place online on 13th October 2022 and provided an overview of the DWELL project and its key achievements. Prof Eleni Hatzidimitriadou and the CCCU team (Sharon Manship, Dr Julia Moore, Nikki Price, Thomas Thompson) are responsible for the evaluation of DWELL and presented the preliminary findings at the Final Conference. Highlights of the findings are:

- Improvements in metabolic health
 - Reductions in weight, BMI, waist circumference, HbA1c (glycated haemoglobin/blood sugar)
- Enhanced empowerment
- Improved management of diabetes
 - Greater perceived personal control and understanding of diabetes
 - Decrease in negative feelings associated with diabetes
 - Increase in optimism for treatment and long-term prognosis of diabetes
 - Decrease in eating in response to emotions and external cues
 - Increase in restrained eating
- Improvement in physical and mental health
- Improved quality of life

This short video <u>DWELL Participant Stories - YouTube</u> premiered at the conference and features some of the participants of the programme talking about the impact DWELL has had on their lives.

The CCCU DWELL team will also be joining partners to present at the Diabetes Professional Care Conference in London on 16th and 17th November 2022.

Among the key areas of work by Canterbury Christ Church that demonstrate the breadth and depth of our Faculty's knowledge exchange activity are:

- * supporting lifelong learning and workforce development needs through the provision of over 100 courses for CPD, ranging from short leadership programmes such as Business Lab (in partnership with Locate in Kent) to modules in health and social care such as Dementia Care.
- award winning Inspiring Minds outreach programme that has engaged with hundreds of local students over the last five years, and encouraged and supported them to explore higher education and study STEM subjects, leading to an improvement in attainment levels
- * over the last four years students and staff have given just under 26,000 hours of volunteering to over 119 registered charities across Kent & Medway

New Discovery Park Health Hub

A new Health Hub was established in Discovery Park by its tenants wanting to create collaboration opportunities with academics and healthcare providers, building on technological developments taking place in this leading innovation centre.

Academics from CCCU contributed to the Neuroscience, Mental Health and Ageing event organised by the Health Hub in April 2022. **Prof Chris Burton**, School of Allied and Public Health Professions and **Dr Gerry Burgess**, Salomons Centre, were keynote speakers. Also, Faculty researchers from Interreg Projects teams **Anne Martin**, **Dr Maria Stein** and **Markus Hunt** showcased projects findings and developments in a CCCU stand.

Further networking events are planned for next year.

FUNDING SUCCESS

Policy in the UK has supported initiatives which aim to reduce emergency hospital admissions where possible as these can result in lengthy stays and put patients at risk of losing mobility & independence. One widely implemented initiative has been the installation of software that predicts each patients' risk of emergency hospital admission. 'PRISMATIC 2' funded by the NIHR Health Services and Delivery Research Programme and led by the University of Swansea, will assess effects of introducing emergency admission risk prediction software across England, investigate whether GPs change how they manage risk and make decisions about admitting patients to hospital when the software is introduced and understand patients' views about communication of risk scores by their GP. Prof Chris Burton, Professor of Health Services Research, Head of School of Allied and Public Health Professions is a Co-investigator.

Beyond the Stigma was an exhibition about staff who self-define as disabled people at the Royal Orthopaedic Hospital NHS Foundation Trust, launched in July 2021.

Dr Nina Worthington from the Sidney De Haan Research Centre for Arts and Health will be undertaking an evaluation of the Beyond the Stigma project, that details its longer-term impact on staff.

Arts in Prisons' project

One of the projects funded by Research England under the Participatory Research Challenge (PRC) funding stream, "Arts in Prisons", led by **Jacqueline Tallent**, Research Fellow, at the Sydney De Haan Research Centre for Arts and Health, has now completed the Public Patient Involvement (PPI) phase of the project with some very exciting results! The project team produced three paintings, co-developed with three groups of prisoners from HMP Maidstone, each representing their interpretation of what art means to them in prison. Findings from this and other Faculty PRC projects will be presented at a final event held at CCCU in November.
