## **Dr Reenee Singh**

Dr Reenee Singh is a Consultant Family and Couples Systemic Psychotherapist with over 25 years experience as a clinician, trainer and researcher. She was the CEO of the Association of Family Therapy and Systemic Practice in the UK and the Editor of the Journal of Family Therapy. Reenee is a Visiting Professor at the University of Bergamo, and she is the Founding Director of the London Intercultural Couples Centre at the Child and Family Practice and has a keen interest in cross-cultural thinking and practice. Reenee is the author of four books and numerous papers on issues of 'race', culture, intercultural couples and qualitative research. She presents her work at national and international conferences and teaches all over the world.

### **Mind the Gap(s): Clinical Supervision across Culture**

Supervising someone from a different cultural background presents unique challenges, dilemmas and opportunities. Sometimes we may assume differences or similarities between the supervisee and ourselves. We may not be sufficiently attuned to the differences between our supervisees and ourselves, with regard to values, ideas and beliefs about mental health, parenting and family and couple relationships. Further, it may be difficult for our supervisees, who may experience themselves as having less power in the supervisory relationship, to challenge such assumptions.

This workshop will bring together:

- A theoretical and research overview of intercultural supervision
- Practice in applying visual and representational exercises, such as the cultural genogram, culturegram and emotion map to supervisory dilemmas.
- An opportunity to consult about material supervisory practice.
